Churchill, Winston. The Crisis, Plus 3 ALS and 1 TLS; With Illustrations by H. C. Christy. New York: The Macmillan Company, 1901. First Edition, First Printing.

This was the best selling novel of 1901. The association of author to recipient, along with the personal letters is significant. Churchill consulted heavily with Hitt for developing this historical fiction which climaxes with the Lincoln-Douglas debate in Freeport, IL. 5" x 7.5", pp. ix, 1-522 with 2 pp. of advertisements for other Churchill books with 8 original, full page illustrations. Loose binding due to separation at spine of rear end paper,

beginning to wear at the corners, light fray at top and bottom of spine.

The blank page after the fep has a half page of short hand in pencil. Very probably Hitt's own hand as he was renown as the gentleman who took the short hand notes at the Lincoln Douglas debates.

3 ALS of 7 pp. and 1 p. TLS, mailing envelopes included as well as a dozen period news clippings. Content: Churchill queries Hitt on the Freeport debate and Lincoln's mood the night before. He introduces the plot of the book to Hitt and questions the authenticity versus what Hitt recalls of that day. Churchill schedules a visit with Hitt to interview him and asks for Hitt's understanding in not being mentioned in the afterwards of the book.

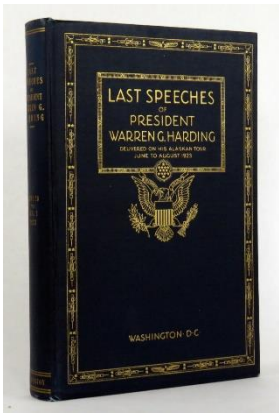
Winston Churchill (Nov 10, 1871 – Mar 12, 1947) was an American best-selling novelist of the early 20th century. At one point in his career at the turn of the century, he was more famous than his British namesake. After he slowed down his writing, he was eclipsed in fame by Winston Spencer Churchill. The two of them met on several occasions and had surprising parallels in their careers.

Robert Roberts Hitt (Jan 16, 1834 – Sep 20, 1906) was an Assistant Secretary of State and later a member of the U.S. House of Representatives. An expert shorthand writer (one of few men of his time who represented that skill), he became a very close friend of future President Abraham Lincoln, and during the famous Lincoln–Douglas debates of 1858, at the request of Lincoln. Hitt served in a variety of federal capacities, including Chargé d'Affaires of the American Delegation to France, as Assistant Secretary of State and in Congress Chairman of the Committee on Foreign Affairs. During the last years of his life, he was Regent of the Smithsonian Institution.

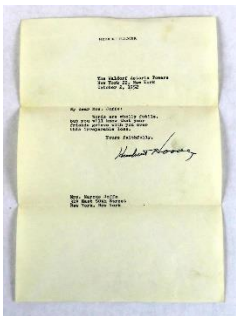

This would be a very fine book were it not for the separation down the spine of the inside cover VG none the less. Lightly bumped bottom corner, else in collectible condition.

Archie W. (Archibald Williamson) Shiels (May 26, 1878 - Sep 1974) was a construction executive of railroads across Alaska and the Yukon for 20 years. Shiels joined the Pacific American Fisheries in 1916, and served as President of the company from 1930-1946. Shiels had an avid interest in Russian America and Alaska. He was a voluminous collector, author and frequent guest speaker. It is not unlikely that he entertained Harding on his Alaskan leg of the tour. Titling on the spine and on the front cover is brightly gilded. Cover design includes National Seal and decorative border.

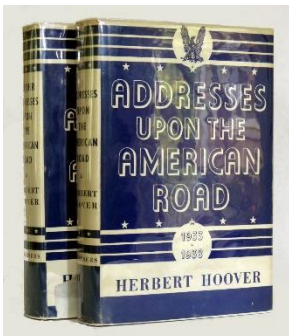

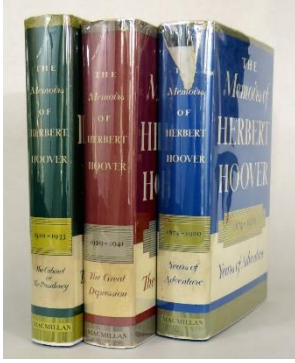

Both volumes have the personal, sequential, Ex-Libris bookplate of J. H. Gipson on front endpaper, #2411-12, with facsimile of Gipson's signature and a ship upon the sea in blue. Gipson was the force behind the development of the Caxton Publishing Co. in Caldwell, ID. Gipson was well known to Hoover as a free market industrialist, striving to bring the true history of Western Americana into print along with educational textbooks. Caxton published the final Vol. 8 of Hoover's Addresses. Dark blue cloth with titling in gilt on the spine and front cover.

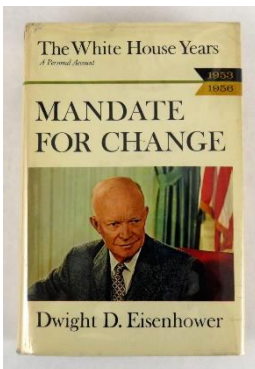

J. H. Gipson (James Herrick) joined Caxton Printing in 1907 as managing director and diligently grew it into one of the largest printer in the West. Initially focusing on school textbooks and a supportive publisher of Western Americana historical nonfiction, the company is still managed by family members to this day. Gipson attracted renown authors including Vardis Fisher and Ayn Rand. Gipson's relationship with Hoover resulted in Caxton publishing Hoover's "Further Addresses on the American Road" Vol. 8 in 1961. Blue cloth over boards with titling in gilt on the spine and a facsimile of Hoover's signature on the cover.

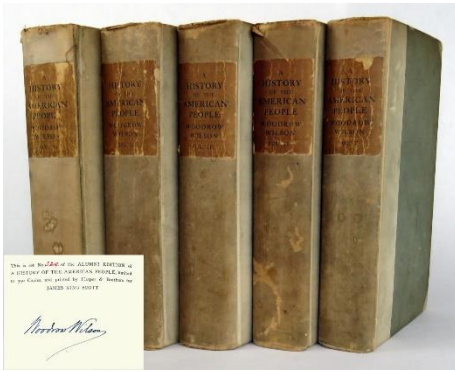

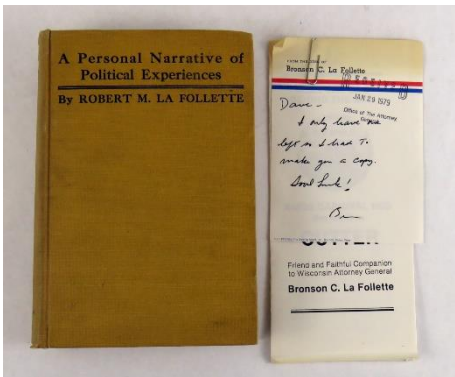

As is often the case with sets, Vol. 1 is usually the most handled and hence the most wear. It has a stain at bottom of spine, front cover split from top half down,

cracked spine at title page. Other volumes exhibit similar aging to the covers, but are intact, well bound, most of wear at the edges of the paper wraps. One half tan cloth with cloth corners and gray paper over boards with titling on a paper tab on the spine.

Wilson's fourth publication, this five-volume work entitled "A History of the American People", was the culmination of a series of articles written for Harper's. The volumes include: I. The Swarming of the English. -- II. Colonies and Nation. -- III. The Founding of the Government. -- IV. Critical Changes and Civil War. -- V. Reunion and Nationalization. "The work is often brilliant in style; the author has read widely and has aimed rather to fuse the facts of American history into artistic literary form than to make investigative contributions to the facts of our development. 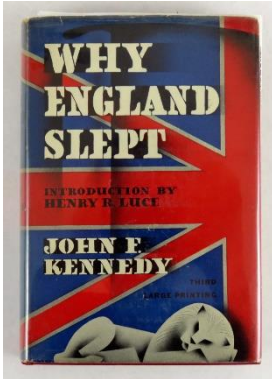

Robert Marion La Follette, Sr. (Jun 14, 1855 – Jun 18, 1925) was an American lawyer and politician. He represented Wisconsin in both chambers of Congress and served as the Governor of Wisconsin. A Republican for most of his career, he ran for President of the United States as the nominee of his own Progressive Party in 1924. He carried Wisconsin and 17% of the popular vote, one of the best performances of a third party candidate. Fine in not issued dust jacket. Yellow / tan cloth over boards with titling on the spine and cover in black.

This is the first U.S. edition of the first book of a future President. Derived from his senior thesis at Harvard, it was published after the first British edition. 8vo 5.35" x 8,25" pp. [x] xxx 3-252. Blued top edge and uncut fore edge. Glue spotting to front and rear end paper, small pink spot bled from cover at bottom of fep, light toning along edges. Clean; no inscriptions or notes, or previous owner names, else very nice copy. Uncommon DJ has wear at corners and along top edge. This is a clean copy of a seminal book from one who was destined to become a great politician. Very good in very good dust jacket. Red cloth with blue and white sleeping lion on the cover and white text on blue band on

spine.

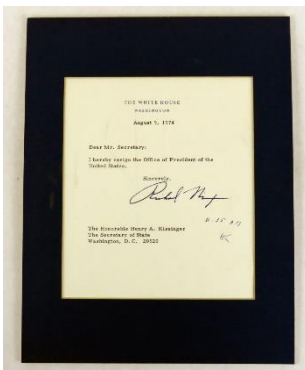

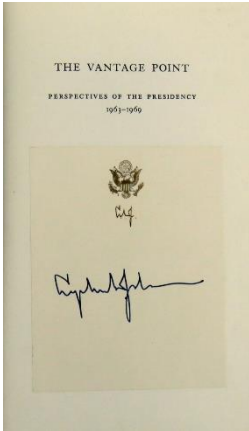

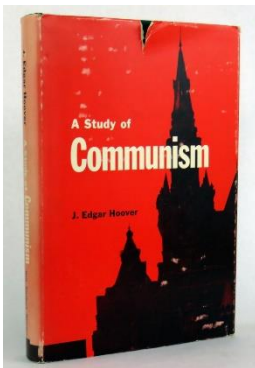

Lyndon Baines Johnson (Aug 27, 1908 – Jan 22, 1973) was the 36th President of the United States from 1963 to 1969, assuming the office upon the death of President Kennedy, after serving as the 37th Vice President of the United States from 1961 to 1963. A Democrat from Texas, he also served as a United States Representative and as the Majority Leader in the United States Senate. Johnson won his first Congressional election to the House of Representatives in 1937. He won election to the Senate in 1948, and was appointed the position of Senate Majority Whip in 1951. He became the Senate Minority Leader in 1953 and the Senate Majority Leader in 1955. As a leader in the Senate, Johnson became known for his domineering personality and the "Johnson treatment", his aggressive coercion of powerful politicians to advance legislation. Fine in fine dust jacket. Bright red cloth with titling blocked in blue on spine and a blue rectangle with LBJ's signature impressed on cover.

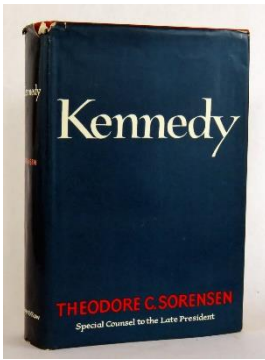

John Edgar Hoover (Jan 1, 1895 – May 2, 1972) was the first Director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI). He was instrumental in founding the FBI in 1935, where he remained director until his death in 1972 at the age of 77. While Hoover had fought bank-robbing gangsters in the 1930s, anti-communism was a bigger focus for him after World War II, as the Cold War developed. In 1956, Hoover was becoming increasingly frustrated by U.S. Supreme Court decisions that limited the Justice Department's ability to prosecute people for their political opinions, most notably communists. Some of his aides reported that he purposely exaggerated the threat of communism to "ensure financial and public support for the FBI.

Leonard Beck "Len" Jordan (May 15, 1899 – Jun 30, 1983) was the 23rd Governor of Idaho and a United States Senator from '62 - '73. Perhaps his greatest service was on the International Joint Commission with Canada. Fine in good + dust jacket. Black cloth over boards with titling on spine in gilt and red.

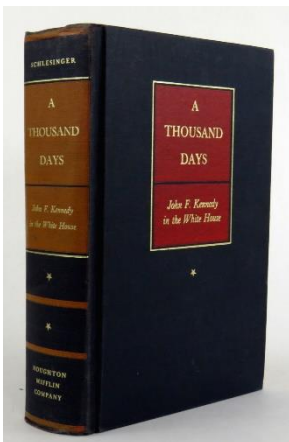

Theodore Chaikin "Ted" Sorensen (May 8, 1928 – Oct 31, 2010) was an American lawyer, writer, and Special counsel to the late Presidential. He was a speechwriter for JFK, as well as one of his closest advisers. President Kennedy once called him his "intellectual blood bank." This is the first, authoritative book by a Kennedy insider following his assassination.

David H. "Dave" Leroy (b. Aug 16, 1947) was the 36th Lieutenant Governor ('83 - '87) and Attorney General of Idaho. Leroy was appointed by President George H. W. Bush as United States Nuclear Waste Negotiator in 1990. Fine in very good dust jacket. Red cloth over boards with titling in gilt on black blocking on spine.

"While he himself did not indulge in comparisons, he was not averse to those who called his speech and bill 'the Second Emancipation Proclamation.' Like the first, it had confronted the issue of the black man's freedom in a white man's society out of necessity as well as belief." (p 506) \$150

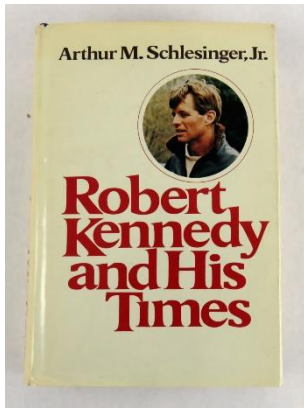

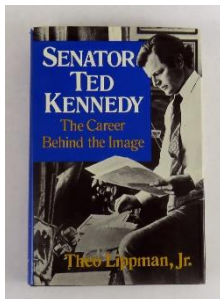

"By November 1967 when Robert Kennedy had his forty-second birthday, he was the most original, enigmatic and provocative figure in mid century American politics." (p 804) \$175

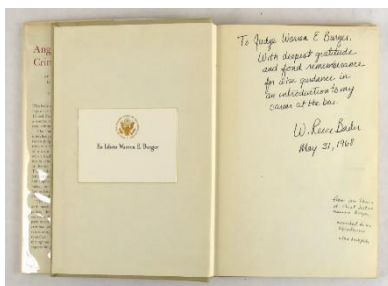

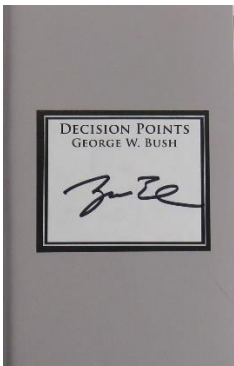


Original Voting Poll From the Contested Presidential Election of 2000. Includes Controversial Butterfly Ballot.

Palm Beach County, FL: 2000. 16" x 13" plastic platform with 5.5" x 7.5", 2 pp. ballot. Includes 10 Ballots and the chad stylus. Printed on the "Butterfly Ballot" are the names of the ten Presidential and Vice Presidential candidates with Bush / Chaney at the top followed by Gore / Lieberman as well as other candidates: Ralph Nader (Green Party), Pat Buchanan (Reform), Monica Moorehead (Workers World).

The confusing design of this ballot layout resulted in as many as 19,000 errant votes. According to a 2001 study in the *American Political Science Review*, the voting errors caused by the butterfly ballot cost Gore the election: "Had PBC used a ballot format in the presidential race that did not lead to systematic biased voting errors, our findings suggest that, other things equal, Al Gore would have won a majority of the officially certified votes in Florida." All fine and unique..

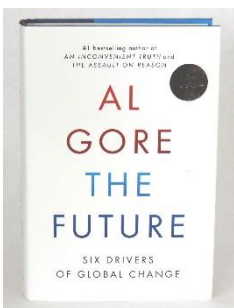

George W. Bush, 43rd President of the United States (2001 - 2009) recounts his time in the oval office which will always be correlated to the War in Iraq. He uses this post presidential memoir to imprint on history his version of events which unfolded from decisions he made or to which he responded. Fine with in fine dust jacket.

"As I record these thoughts more than seven years after American troops liberated Iraq, I strongly believe that removing Saddam from power was the right decision. 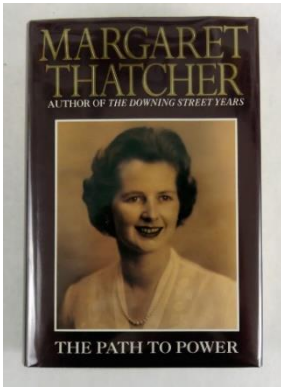

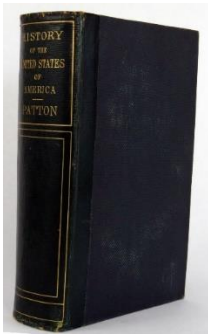

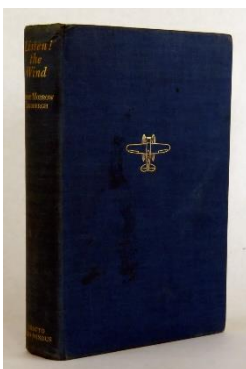
